Dear friends, volunteers and partners of Project URGE,

I joined the Board of Project URGE in 2011 with great enthusiasm about working with a diverse group of Christians that had a heartbeat for God, our city, the local church, and those who are negatively impacted by poverty and the various ways structural racism and biases impact our city.

The vision of having the local church and community cross invisible lines of denomination, race, class, gender and other boundaries — with an implicit goal of working together to fulfill the great commandment to love one another — continues to challenge me on every level.

In January 2021, I assumed the role as Board Chair of Project URGE to fill an immediate need and assist in the process of continuing to propel the vision forward amidst the ever invasive COVID-19 pandemic.

The vision and continuous efforts of "calling the church and community to partner together and create positive change" has been challenging.

"Love the Lord thy God with all your heart, soul, mind, and strength, And demonstrate this love by loving your neighbor as you would love yourself."

Social distancing mandates have made it difficult for us to meet in person, which has put a damper on our efforts to host in person collaborative meetings. The person-to-person meetings afford us the ability to encourage, brainstorm and establish solid relationships that foster the type of care, concern and commitment needed to pull together strategies aimed at transforming communities in and around Rochester.

In spite of the challenges, Project URGE has managed to thrive and utilize the downtime to educate ourselves and many of our team members with the hopes of being wiser, and better equipped to serve as a liaison between the local church and community and potential partnering organizations in the future.

Educational opportunities that board members have attended include:

- PathStone Foundation's "Beyond Profit" 12 week training course aimed at helping non-profit organizations consider their vision, goal, structure, and processes for future growth and ministry effectiveness.
- Causewave's RP3 (Rapid Prioritization, Planning and Process) multi-session evaluation and strategic planning for MINO
- Focused Communities Strategies Change Makers Open House (Lupton Center)
- Network for Good (multiple free seminars and consultations)
- Ongoing participation in Restoration Rochester's **Community Collaborativ**e networking group, and opportunities to present Project URGE to other serving organizations
- Consultations with United Way, City Shapers Roc City Faith-Based Community Service Alliance, Samra Brouk staff, Unite Us



While we were not able to host in person meetings we have had great dialogue via ZOOM meetings which have been organized and presented by Project URGE's Diversity Café Ministry and its leader, Candyce Singletary. Guest speakers and panelists shared insights, fielded questions and offered suggestions on various subjects, including the normalization of black murder, health disparity and the role race plays, racial healing and reconciliation, building generational wealth, and how race influences law enforcement conduct and approach.

Meetings are scheduled for the third Saturday of each month at 11 a.m. We invite all to join the conversation by emailing prourge.communication@gmail.com for a link, and welcome suggestions of topics of interest and potential speakers that those interested would like to see in the future.

Mother's in Need of Others (MINO) has continued to be a light in the community. Our collaborative work at and with the staff of Youth For Christ has proven to be a win/win situation. Maria Wehrle and her team have been busier than ever as the needs for assistance has grown exponentially.



Going forward, Project URGE hopes to add the House of David ministry under its umbrella. This initiative, under the direction of Candyce Singletary, would provide youth probation employment support in obtaining trade skills and certification and employment, and/or youth and adult parole employment support which would assist individuals on parole with job coaching and finding employment as part of reentry planning.

As community grants and donations have assisted in moving the ministry forward, so does the need for ongoing commitments to ensure that this ministry will continue to be available for the hundreds of needy mothers who find their way to our program throughout the year.

Please know that we are forever grateful for those who continue to support Project URGE, Inc. and its mission, and we are blessed to have a dedicated professionals such as Tim Beck handling the funds, keeping the books and ensuring the integrity of your gifts and how they are best put to work.

As we move forward, we are putting out a clarion call for an executive director who can dedicate their time and energy to building relationships and continuing to foster collaborations that move us from passive conversations to community builders proving our Love for God by our Commitment to Loving our Community into wholeness.

We thank you and hope you will continue to stand with us on this incredible journey.

CELEBRATING 20 YEARS









This March, Project URGE, Inc. celebrates two decades of bringing churches and community together to create positive change.

With planning underway in late summer 2001, its first formal meeting was held in March 2002. Over the last twenty years, Project URGE has continued to work with the following goals in mind:

- 1) Provide opportunities for communication, networking, and fellowship among churches, community organizations, and individuals in order to foster collaboration among those who serve in under-resourced areas
- 2) Provide and support educational events in order to strengthen and better enable our combined urban ministry efforts
- 3) Provide tangible goods and services to those in need through our Project URGE-sponsored ministries.

Project URGE supporters have remained committed to demonstrating their faith through their works.

Twenty years have seen a number of collaborative efforts with Project URGE leading the charge:

- The annual fall URGEnt Presentation & Workshops, which highlighted urban ministries working to make a
 difference within areas of poverty, and offered ways to empower under-resourced neighborhoods,
 increased participants' awareness of the number of different programs already functioning in the Rochester
 area, recruited people to volunteer, provide financial and prayer support, train and inspire community
 development with practical and achievable steps, and encourage congregations to work across racial and
 denominational lines.
- The URGEncy Coat & Food Collection was a key part of the annual Presentation & Tour. Area churches were asked to donate both winter coats and dry goods to be redistributed to Rochester ministries serving the poor.
- **The Bread Run** delivered baked goods to homeless shelters and soup kitchens weekly starting in 2004, thereby supporting and enhancing those services.
- Jacob's Ladder provided "handy-man" services to affiliated churches/organizations in order to maintain or renovate facilities. Their labor of love over the years saved affiliates thousands of dollars of expense, allowing ministries to spend more of their financial resources on serving those in need and less on the facility itself.
- **Volunteer coordination** provided by Project URGE allowed hundreds of students and others from church groups and schools to serve within partnering urban ministries. It also facilitated the partnering of urban and suburban churches in providing urban youth summer camps.
- Mothers in Need of Others ministry [MINO] has been effective in collecting and redistributing household and children's items to families in crisis.
- Concerts of Praise, the Furnished 4 Life thrift store, Free to Fly Ministry, Saturday Sonshine Club and the Christmas Store were also valuable initiatives that helped meet needs, connect people and build relationships across denominational, racial and class lines.

Project URGE, Inc. has historically maintained a close alignment with the principles of the Christian Community Development Association [CCDA]. Key Project URGE leaders have attended training conferences and have hosted CCDA speakers and urban practitioners in Rochester, including Dr. John Perkins, Dr. Wayne Gordon, Dr. Barbara Williams-Skinner, Leroy Barber, Noel Castellanos (CEO of CCDA), and Pastor Jonathan Brooks.



Serving mothers with the light of Christ's love





No one will deny that these are challenging times we are living in! One need not look far to see examples of a broken world.

But there are those who view adversity as an opportunity, a chance to do something different, to mend what is broken, to help heal ills, to try and leave this world a little better than it was before. It's not about refusing to see or denying "what is," but about not letting "what is" poison or prevent what could be.

Having had the privilege of running this ministry for seventeen years, I have seen a lot of what is, and I have chosen to be motivated, inspired by, and spurred into action by those who hold onto the hope of what could be and use that as a catalyst for change.

I am truly touched and encouraged to see the number of individuals who have stepped up and stepped out to say "enough is enough", "I choose to do something different," "change starts with "ME!"

And those "me" people are starting to work together to form groups of "we" people! Project URGE and MINO have always been about collaborating and networking with others to help families in need in our community. But this year, we took it to a whole new level and asked our partners to commit to sharing resources and time with us to serve the growing number of individuals in crisis.

We challenged them to share donations and supplies with us that we frequently distribute but that they might not have need for. We requested that they consider volunteering time with our ministry to pack supplies for families who need them.

We asked them to think about doing a donation drive or fundraiser with or for us in order for us to better serve not only the moms who utilize their services, but the other 126 agencies, churches, schools, and daycare programs MINO provides for.

I am here to tell you that this plea has yielded some AMAZING results! We are looking to develop reciprocal relationships with agencies, churches, schools, and home daycare programs in Monroe County, sharing volunteers, resources, and helping to advertise needs and events for one another.

The agencies listed here are actively partnering with us, providing extra diapers, baby food, formula, baby bottles, and hygiene and paper products that they had in surplus or do not distribute on a regular basis. Or they're hosting community baby showers to provide the items we regularly supply families in need through their care managers.

With the assistance of the agencies, churches, community service clubs, and individuals, we were able to distribute an INCREDIBLE 7,578 items to families in need throughout this year!

To start meaningful conversations that will build lasting relationships, spark creative solutions, foster unity and lead to positive change in Rochester.



Volunteer Coordination

Volunteer opportunities have been greatly diminished over the past two years due to the pandemic. In the past we have plugged in volunteers from high schools, church groups and individuals, who wanted to find a place to serve their community, but that has been greatly compromised recently.

When we have had calls or emails requesting us to assist with finding volunteer opportunities, after ascertaining what types of tasks the person would be looking to fill or what capacity they are qualified to serve, most inquiries have been referred to our own ministry team, Mothers In Need of Others (MINO), or to Foodlink's volunteer site.

It does not appear that circumstance will change in the immediate future, although we all hope they will sooner than later.

Community Development

Our efforts put forward on community development centered around what has been termed The 5 Point Plan, which has been in existence since 2006 and has had numerous revisions.

In brief, that plan is focused on bringing leaders in neighborhoods, residents, business people and non-profit organizations to form a cohesive group to plan and advocate for what is needed, as well as, to draw on assets that are already present in five neighborhoods.

It's a plan that fuses Asset Based Community Development, Common Wealth, and ideas from dozens of workshops offered by the Christian Community Development Association, that have successes throughout the country. As a bonus opportunity with the plan, there was the possibility of working with the Lupton Group as consultants to these efforts. The Lupton Group, along with FCS Ministries, has been a leader in transforming underresourced neighborhoods in South Atlanta for over twenty years.

Discussions on how this plan could roll out took place on several occasions with United Way representatives, staff at Senator Samra Brouk's office and with several non-profits. Despite efforts to bring a multitude of organizations together to have an informative discussion on how we might all share and build a concerted effort toward transforming hurting neighborhoods, nothing materialized from these attempts, despite an opportunity for some initial funding to get the wheels in motion.

After dozens of years lamenting major recurring problems and the disconnect between organizations working in tandem toward the alleviation of poverty, there continue to be only minor changes in cultivating meaningful working relationships that will foster and propel the community toward more positive outcomes in under-resourced neighborhoods. The pandemic has served to augment these challenges.
