4 Point Plan — Project URGE, Inc. by Garry Manuel, Director Planning & Engaging to Impact Neighborhoods

Approximately 80% of the ministries and organizations affiliated with Project URGE are located along the "poverty crescent". We've divided that route into four targeted areas. The ministries and organizations are being asked to plan and collaborate together on impacting their neighborhood by:

- Determining what services, ministries and assets are already in place within the area, comprised of pre-existing Project URGE relationships
- Assess the strengths and weaknesses
- Reach out to those in the area, not presently in the Project URGE "family", who are willing to provide a supportive element in this collaborative effort
- Engage others who have ministries/organizations that have the capacity to reach a particular area addressing a specific need or expertise
- Implementing the plans to transform neighborhoods

In the Fall of 2005 we drafted an outline for the plan, which focused primarily upon strengthening the relationships we had been cultivating for a number of years within Project URGE, then, reaching out to forge additional strategic cooperation. After attending a CCDA (Christian Community Development Association) Conference in Indianapolis, we folded many of these ideas and methods into the "4 Point Plan". Those workshops were offered by leaders (some with over twenty years experience) who have been tenacious and successful in reversing trends of racism and poverty in cities such as Chicago, Dallas, Baltimore, Miami and etc.

Our hope is to engage churches in the process by linking specific expertise (now seated in the congregations) to the areas of need, along with more volunteers and financial support as these projects develop.

In this way the planning and action for these initiatives stem from those living, working and serving in those areas, but we seek to find people who can also provide some missing features. I'll compare it to cooking a meal – all the main ingredients are present; however, you may need a bigger oven, or some extra ingredients to fortify the dish, or some extra spices (in someone else's cupboard) to make it taste better. Farm Markets

In conjunction with *Foodlink* we hope to establish farm markets in the 4 areas in order to 1) make available nutritional foods to more of the under-resourced neighborhoods, 2) create new jobs, 3) create a hub where people in the neighborhood can receive important information (i.e. health, education, spiritual needs) and 4) at the same time support farmers in the area (some who are also struggling).

Homeless Transition

Additionally, Ruth Fisher and Lisa Lewis from Homeless and Housing (CFC) are drafting a plan to help with transitional housing for the homeless. This suggestion grew from our February meeting, sprouting from an article published in *Christianity Today's* February issue called, "Bridge to a Place Called Home".

In a nutshell, the plan would have churches sponsor a homeless person or family for about

a year, to provide decent transitional housing, while mentors and/or case managers would provide training, counseling and education to assist in the process. The fact remains that people who are typically in crisis or repeatedly returning to shelters need more time and familiarity with positive models than the usual 15-30 day stay. There needs to be a more holistic approach to changing people's circumstances.

The Promise within the 4 Points

The promise of this collaboration in the 4 Point Plan is unprecedented. It will become a reality when 1) people are involved, contributing and committed to planning and action, 2) the church responds to the call, 3) city and county government work in harmony with these efforts and begin to remove perceived barriers in these targeted areas and 4) that prayer continually surrounds all these areas of activities.

Community Service Impacts the Giver and Receiver

Service opportunities have generated returns for all involved. One of the focal points for Project URGE has been to create awareness of the needs, which in turn, opens the door to serving. Many times an experience plants a seed which can grow for a lifetime. The hope is that growth will in turn produce more seeds, which will produce a greater return.

A variety of tasks are fulfilled, through both the REACH program and the 30 Hour Famine efforts, which include: sorting clothing, organizing crafts for summer camp, painting, cleaning, reading to children and unpacking food.

The groups have served at Rochester Family Mission, Women's Place, Outreach Temple (Home Mission),

Sanctuary House, Grace Community Village, Mercy Residential, Eastern Service Workers Association, Francis Center, Community Lutheran Ministries and Foodlink.

"They were valuable experiences for all of the kids and adults as well" said Sue Turiano. "They were wonderful! This was the first time that we experienced this and were totally shocked and amazed by their willingness to work steadily and efficiently for what seemed like forever. The Mission Department of Outreach Temple has been in operation for about 9 years. We serve a hot meal every Saturday from 12 noon until 2pm. This meal is served to any in need of food. These are people primarily from the Murray, Ames St. and Lyell Ave. area, as well as other neighborhoods in close proximity. From time to time we deliver a hot meal to Sanctuary House, a womenchildren's shelter in our area.

We serve about 450 people monthly. This includes any one who desires to have a hot, well-balanced meal. Some are homeless or on very low incomes. Our Food Pantry gives out food every Friday to people in the same area. We give them enough food for about three complete meals.

We serve about 155 households monthly. We also give food to families throughout the City of Rochester on a one-time basis. These people are referred to us by other agencies, such as Life line, Family Mission etc. These are emergencies.

We serve them, then refer them to a pantry in their area. Our endeavor is to reach the people in need in our community and let them know there is some one who cares. We not only feed them naturally, but also feed them spiritually. We have Missionaries and a Minister on hand if they would like prayer or just needing the encouragement that God loves them. as we do. We also pass out informational flyers that will direct them to places where their individual needs can be met. We have one on one conversations with those simply needing someone to talk with.

We are blessed to have people from other churches in the city and suburban areas that come to help us prepare meals, serve, give out food, etc. We get bread, cake, donuts etc. from Tops, in Canandaigua, which is delivered to us every Saturday by a Project URGE team, consisting primarily of those from Crosswinds Wesleyan Church. We get the bulk of our food from Foodlink; however, they do not give items such as paper products, eggs, milk, condiments etc. Our church is very small so we depend on donations of these items as well as monetary donations from our friends, and family churches. We are always in need of financial assistance, as well as people to help cook, serve, and transport and give out food.

Rochester Teen Challenge



Exciting things are happening at the center. We have 4 students that have recently completed the Induction phase here at Rochester, and have advanced to the second phase in Rehrersburg, Pennsylvania. We have also received 4 new students here at the center this month.

2 of our students have made recent rededications to Christ. One of our students received prayer and received a healing. Another student testified that he has felt a release from God that he is now totally free from drug addiction, and can just focus on building his relationship with the Lord. Our newest student was presented with the gospel, and is considering making a decision to serve the Lord. We thank God for the miraculous transformation in the lives of these students.

We are networking with the Rochester Urban Center and Candle House Teen Challenge once again for street outreach. We are planning on 5 outreach weeks over this Spring and Summer. There are many people who have great needs in their lives. We plan to take the love of Jesus to the city streets to those who need to hear about him. Jesus has given the command to go out, and compel people to come into His kingdom. We have been doing some improvements to our center to better serve our students on our North wing. Four bathrooms were upgraded with new showers, new tile and paint. We have also been going room to room and doing cosmetic repairs. We do have an unexpected special need. We had a sewer line that collapsed, and also a supply line that needed replacement. The total cost for this was \$2,650.00. If you would like to help us with a special gift to help cover this cost, it would be greatly appreciated.

This month we have 3 special holidays: Mother's day on May 14^{th,} Armed Forces Day on May 20^{th,} and Memorial Day on the last Monday of the month. We give a special tribute to all mothers this month, to all who serve in our armed services, and to the memory of all who have given the supreme sacrifice of themselves in service, and defense of this country! Rochester Teen Challenge Student Testimonies



Hi, my name is John. I am 28. I have been using drugs since I was 16. Because of my pride, I thought I was strong enough to just stop on my own, but I was wrong. I fought a losing battle for many years. About a year ago my mother hung a beautiful picture of Jesus over my bed, and told me she put it there so He could watch over me. Now it didn't matter whether or not I was high or sober, I was always staring at this picture. I had even picked up a Bible a couple of times and read it. Well, one day when I was at my worst I got on my knees and prayed for God to help me. About a week later my sister asked if I wanted to go to church with

her and I told her "no." As she was leaving God spoke to me, and told me I should go. So I chased her down the driveway and went. When I got there it was like the service was written for me. By the end of it I was ready to turn my life over to God. I was saved that night, and the next

day I had made the decision to come to Teen Challenge. I have been clean for two and a half months now, and I am considering going to Bible college when I complete Teen Challenge.

Hi, my name is Rick. I'm 25 and from Rochester. I was raised by both parents until I was 10, when they divorced. I became very angry about it. To deal with my anger I became abusive to myself, and others. I started using drugs around the age of 13. By the time I was 16 I used pot every day, and started using cocaine. It progressed over the years. By the time I was 20, I was married with a child, but also completely addicted to drugs and alcohol.

By age 21 I had separated from my wife. I came to Teen Challenge. I went through the entire program and graduated. God did many things in my

life. He restored my relationship with my family. After completing the program, I didn't put into practice what I had learned. Within a few months I fell away from God. I started using drugs again, and ended up worse off. I went through a divorce, and had a very poor relationship with my daughter. It took a couple of years, but the pain was unbearable at the end. God brought me back to Teen Challenge in December. God has delivered me from not just drug addiction, but also suicide and sexual addictions. He has released me from my anger, and is showing me what He wants me to do. The relationship with my daughter is slowly being restored. God is calling me to attend Bible college this fall. I thank God for Teen Challenge because without it I would never have met God, or have been restored to His kingdom. I am learning new ways to go through this temporary life through God's Word.

On Saturday, Dec. 3rd, 6 volunteers sorted, bagged and delivered 34 bags of coats (about 360 coats), gloves, towels and blankets to several locations throughout the Project Urge family, including Francis Center's men's homeless shelter, Eastern Service Workers boutique, for low-income workers and their families, Grace Community Village's community shop, where low-income families can shop for used items, Mercy Residential Services teen mother live-in location and Women's Place, a mothers and childrens homeless shelter. In addition, new items will be provided to Catholic Family Services for homeless Christmas programs as we have done in the past.

Coats were graciously provided by Fairport Evangelical Church, Crosswinds Wesleyan, New Covenant Fellowship and the Outreach Temple (COGICU). In addition, the Lutheran community of the Rochester Area provided coats directly to Community Lutheran Ministries for distribution in the Joseph Ave. neighborhood. Additionally, the Canandaigua Baptist Church was involved in a later Coatlink drive.

Friends Helping Friends News:

"Delays, Setbacks, Progress and Successes."

As many people already know, the purchase of our new food distribution warehouse at 333 Child Street (507-509 Jay Street) has been delayed. Since the property is a foreclosure property, we're having difficulties with the current owner's creditors. Friends Helping Friends had coordinated with the two creditors FHF to purchase the building and anticipated closing on the purchase of the facility in early December. However, immediately before the purchase of the property, our lawyer found out that yet another creditor had placed a judgment on the property. Thus, the first creditor has had to foreclose on the property to remove the existing judgments obtain a clean title and then sell the property to Friends Helping Friends. Even though this delay has been frustrating, we like the location of the property, the size and layout of the facility, as well as the good condition and the price. We decided that we were willing to wait for the right building. In addition, we've had more time to work on the other projects on our agenda. Friends Helping Friends appreciates the flexibility of Dave Delano at M&T Bank and Raylene Clark-Gomes of the Institute of Community Economics. In addition, we'd also like to thank our legal counsel for handling the negotiations & closing of the purchase, Joe Lentini & Rudy LePore.

The Bikes for Youth Mentoring Program



Friends Helping Friends originally began working with Second Life Bikes, a small family-run bicycle program coordinated by local bicycle philanthropist, Ray Fitzgerald. After Mr. Fitzgerald moved to Florida in September, Friends Helping Friends has decided to bring the same bicycle mentorship program "in-house." Coordinating this bicycle repair program in-house will prevent hassles associated with partnering with another organization and will use the expertise of FHF's Board of Directors. A retiree, Mr. Dan Lill, the program coordinator, will use his youth development background as a teacher at the Rochester School for the Deaf and his recent experience working at St. Joseph's House's bike clinic. The dissolution of the partnership between Second Life Bikes and FHF has caused considerable delays. We're just finishing the needed renovations for 226-230 Hudson Avenue and will be orienting mentors in mid-April.

"PICKING UP THE PIECES," the strategic plan that Mayor Johnson and the Greater Rochester Community developed called for the creation of *Safe Havens for Challenged Youth* to address youth alienation. "These havens should ... provide a supportive environment where the youth can learn and access needed services, develop relationships, and find opportunities and strategies to be productive and successful."

If you haven't already considered it, consider learning about bicycle repair and youth work and be a mentor in FHF's "Bikes for Youth Mentoring Program." Friends Helping Friends is working to have youth development and bicycle repair trainers available. Even if you haven't worked with kids or have little bicycle repair skills, all you have to do is be willing to learn! The BYMP will provide training in bicycle repair, as well as counseling in youthwork for mentors that are willing to commit to one year of mentoring. Colin Powell, among others, have heralded mentoring as a cost-efficient and effective way of changing behaviors, especially among kids with incarcerated parents or youth that are involved in the criminal justice system.

ESWA PREPARES TO MOVE INTO NEW OFFICE CENTRAL; LAUNCHES SPRING EXPANSION CAMPAIGN

New Office Central

Eastern Service Workers Association (ESWA) is excited to announce that construction on our new Office Central, at the corner of First and Bay Street, is virtually complete. The new building is located next door to our current office at 244 Bay Street, and will give us twice as much space to be able to expand our self-help efforts on behalf of our membership of low-income workers and their families.

We plan to move into the new building within the next two weeks and to hold a Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony and Open House in late May. (Date TBA).

Spring Expansion Campaign

At the same time, we are launching our Spring Expansion Campaign. Low-income workers face terrible debt this spring from winter heating bills. Coupled with rising costs for other essentials such as food and gasoline, many families are at risk of utility shut-offs, eviction notices, or will not be able to afford food with sufficient protein and calories to maintain an adequate diet.

We will be holding our annual *Spring Into Action Brunch* to bring together our members and their families and others from the community to celebrate the beginning of spring as a time of renewal and hope. The event provides a hot, nutritious meal to families and features an Easter Egg Hunt and games and activities for children. It will be held on **Saturday, April 8th at 11:00 a.m. at The Aquinas Institute at 1127 Dewey Avenue in Rochester**. Please join us.

Canvass Volunteers Needed

We especially need more volunteers to join our twice a week membership canvasses this spring. On the canvass, teams of ESWA members and volunteers go house to house in low-income neighborhoods. Through this process we make the all-important face-to-face contact with those most in need of self-help organization. We get the word out about our free of charge 11-point Benefit Program, which meets the survival needs of our members, and the ability for self-help through collective action in neighborhoods where the need for organization is greatest.

Canvasses go out twice a week: Saturdays from 10:30-3:30 p.m. and Tuesdays from 12:30-5:30 p.m. (Both preceded by an orientation for first time volunteers which begins 1/2 hour prior to the canvass.)

Canvassers go out in teams of two or three, with new volunteers paired up with an experienced canvasser. The entire canvass is lead by an experienced organizer.

Dental Benefit Needs Volunteers

We also have an urgent need right now for volunteer dentists and others to help expand our non-emergency dental benefit. In February, in conjunction with the Seventh District Dental Society, we conducted "Give Families A Smile" Day at Monroe Community College.
